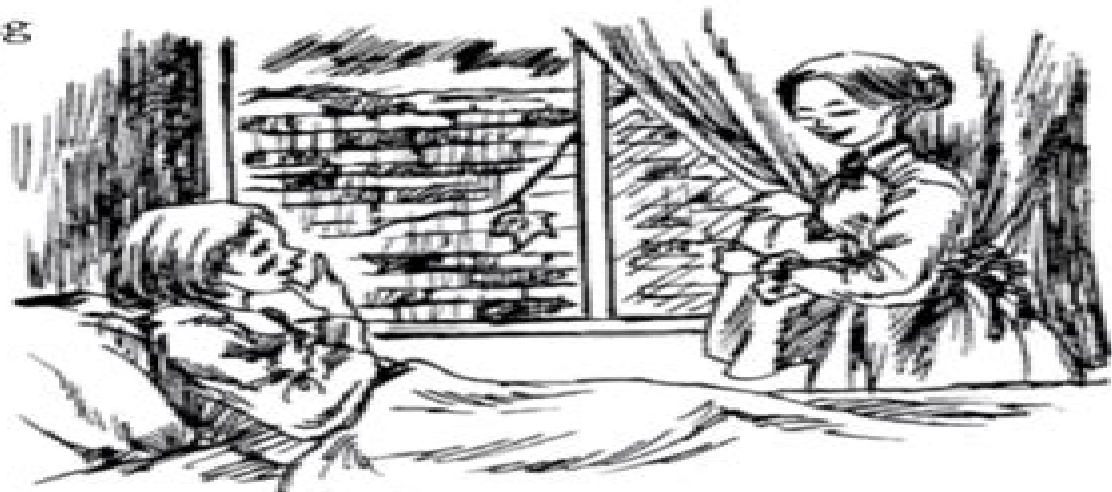


The ivy leaf was still there.
