**Prison Narratives from Boethius to Zana** P. Phillips, 2014-07-24 Prison Narratives from Boethius to Zana critically examines selected works of writers from the sixth century to the twenty first century who were imprisoned for their beliefs. Chapters explore figures' lives, provide close analyses of their works, and offer contextualization of their prison writings.

**Feminism's Empire** Carolyn J. Eichner, 2022-06-15 Feminism's Empire investigates the complex relationships between imperialism and feminisms in the late nineteenth century and demonstrates the challenge of conceptualizing pro imperialist and anti imperialist as binary positions. By intellectually and spatially tracing the era's first French feminists' engagement with empire, Carolyn J. Eichner explores how feminists opposed yet employed approaches to empire in writing, speaking, and publishing. In differing ways, they ultimately tied forms of imperialism to gender liberation. Among the era's first anti imperialists, French feminists were enmeshed in the hierarchies and epistemologies of empire. They likened their gender-based marginalization to imperialist oppressions. Imperialism and colonialism's gendered and sexualized racial hierarchies established categories of inclusion and exclusion that rested in both universalism and ideas of nature that presented colonized people with theoretical yet impossible paths to integration. Feminists faced similar barriers to full incorporation due to the gendered contradictions inherent in universalism. The system presumed citizenship to be male and thus positioned women as outsiders. Feminism's Empire connects this critical struggle to hierarchical power shifts in racial and national status that created uneasy linkages between French feminists and imperial authorities.

**Revolution and Women's Autobiography in Nineteenth-Century France** Kathleen Hart, 2021-11-08 Here for the first time is a book devoted exclusively to the topic of women's autobiography in nineteenth-century France. Tracing the rise of autobiography in relation to women's domestic confinement, Kathleen Hart demonstrates how Flora Tristan, George Sand, and Louise Michel transformed the genre. Inspired by Romantic socialism, each of these remarkable autobiographers links the story of her personal development to socio-historic change. In the wake of the 1830 Revolution, Tristan chronicles social unrest as she relates her progressive transformation into humanity's Woman Guide in *Peregrinations of a Pariah* (1838). Writing in the aftermath of the 1848 Revolution, Sand consolidates her role as a mediator between the rich and the poor in *Story of My Life* (1854). A legend of the 1871 Paris Commune, Michel establishes herself as the poet and prophet of a mythical Revolution yet to come in her *Memoirs* (1886). Exploring the dynamic interplay between revolution and feminist acts of self-affirmation, *Revolution and Women's Autobiography in Nineteenth-Century France* will appeal to scholars of history, French culture, literature, and women's studies.

**Uncanonical Women** Wendy Greenberg, 2023-12-14 In English, here is presented for the first time an examination of the text and context of five nineteenth-century French women poets: Elisa Mercoeur (1808-1835), Marceline Desbordes-Valmore (1786-1859), Louisa Siefert (1845-1877), Louise Ackermann (1813-1890), and Louise Michel (1830-1905). These writers will demonstrate that in spite of mentoring by various literary, historic, or even family figures, these writers found their

own voices A striking example is Louisa Siefert who in spite of bold intertextuality displays an unmistakably feminine persona whose originality poignantly draws the reader's attention These poets had many obstacles to overcome as women identified poets For example Louise Ackermann's own husband did not want her to write and for this reason she remained silent during her who years of marriage Louise Michel is a different case as an analysis of the short poem *Bouche close* *Le Livre du Baigneur* 1873 1880 will demonstrate In short *Uncanonical Women* explores a crescendo of poetic voice from the initial timid solicitations of Elisa Mercoeur to the bold self-sufficient defiance of Louise Michel The implication of my original findings that uncanonical poets can surpass cultural marginalization is that the book will target both a traditional and modern readership Major these and clear language and tools that delineate identifiably personal style of true writers and the poetic persona of each is unique Mercoeur in ambition Desbordes-Valmore in domesticity Siefert in anguish Ackermann in pessimism and Michel in leadership

**BOOK JACKET** [The Roland Legend in Nineteenth Century French Literature](#) Harry Redman Jr., 2014-07-15 The year was 778 Charlemagne starting homeward after an expedition onto the Iberian Peninsula left his nephew Count Roland in command of a rear guard As Roland and his troops moved through the Pyrenees a fierce enemy swooped down and annihilated them Whether the attackers were Moors Basques Gascons or Aquitainians is still disputed The massacre soon passed into legend preserved but at the same time expanded and interpreted in oral tradition and written accounts Dormant after the late Middle Ages the legend began to inspire literary works even before the discovery and publication of the Oxford manuscript *Chanson de Roland* in 1837 The French Revolution and Empire temporarily relieving Roland of his religious aura hailed him as a patriot belaboring his country's foes The Romantics made him either a dauntless irrepressible extrovert or a noble victim struck down while making the world a better place As the twentieth century dawned a few authors scoffed at hero worship but others held up Roland as a heroic example

The earliest known literary productions by women living in Europe were probably written by French writers As early as the 12th century women troubadours in the south of France were writing poems French women continued writing through the ages their number increasing as education became more available to women of all classes And yet of the great number of works by women writers who preceded the current feminist movement very few have survived A few writers such as Marie de France George Sand and Simone de Beauvoir became part of the canon But critics mostly male had judged the works of only a few women writers worthy of recognition As part of the feminist move to reclaim women writers and to rethink literary history scholars in French literature began to take a new look at women writers who had been popular during their lifetimes but who had not been admitted into the canon This reference book provides extensive information about French women writers and the world in which they lived Included are several hundred alphabetically arranged entries for authors literary genres such as the novel poetry and the short story literary

movements such as classicism realism and surrealism life cycle events particular to women such as menstruation and menopause events and institutions which affected women differently than men such as revolutions wars and laws on marriage divorce and education The volume spans French literature from the Middle Ages to the present and covers those writers who lived and worked mainly in France The entries are written by expert contributors and each includes bibliographical information The entries focus on each writer s awareness of how her gender shaped her outlook and opportunities on how categorizations structures and terms used to describe literary works have been defined for women and the ways in which women writers have responded to these definitions The volume begins with a feminist history of French literature and concludes with a selected general bibliography and a chronology of women writers
