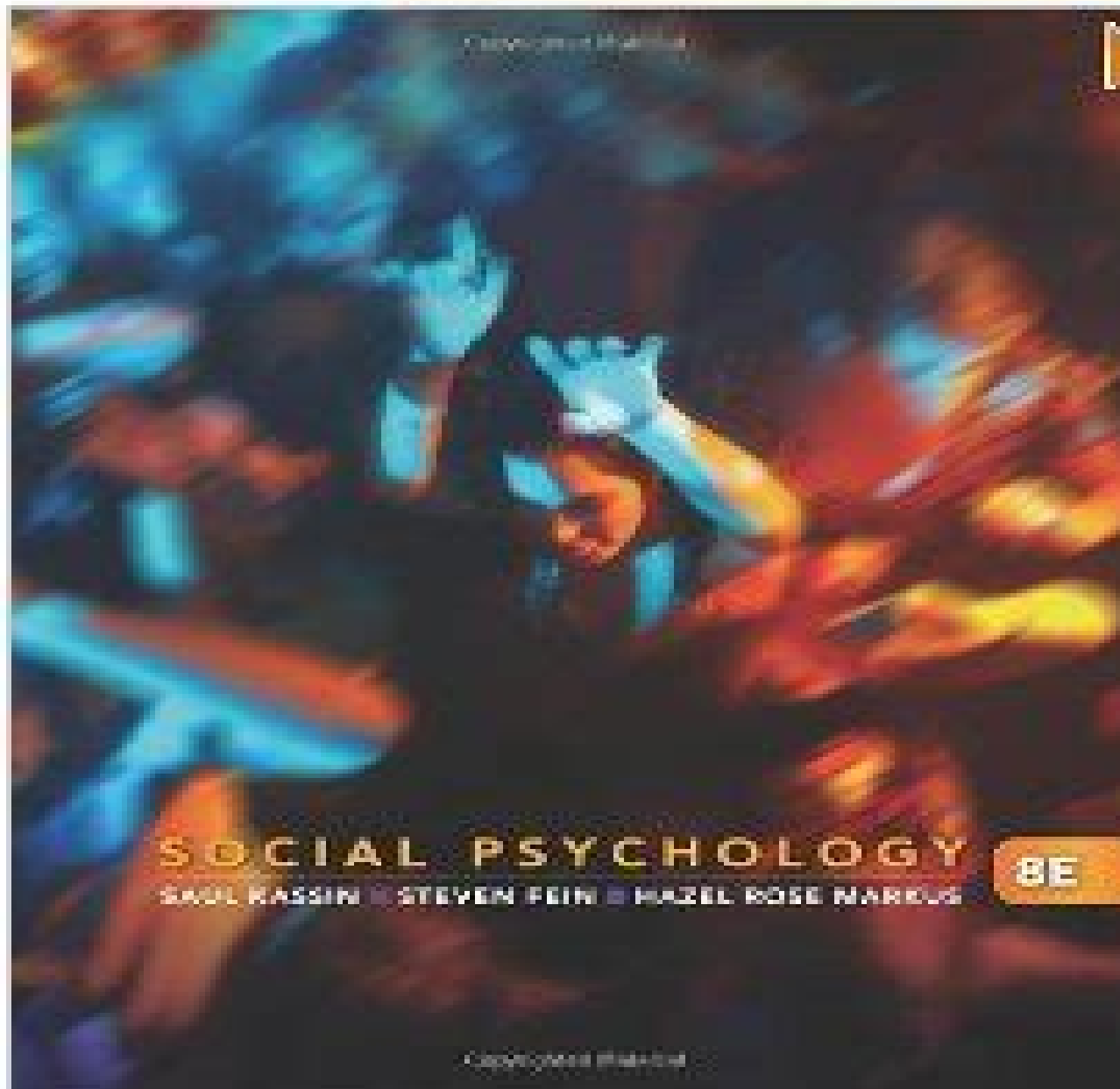

forgetting phenomenon Cognitive experiments on directed forgetting have shown that we are able to deal more effectively with large amounts of information by following instructions to treat some of the information as to be forgotten In this way interference is reduced and we are able to devote all of our resources to the remaining to be remembered information The mechanisms that lead to this reduction continue to promote new experiments but over a quarter century of research maintains that the directed forgetting effect is robust
