PART ONE: CHAPTERS 1-11

Point of View: the person or voice that is narrating or relating the events of the story.

Third Person Point of View (limited or omniscient):

The narrator does not participate in the action of the story as one of the characters. We learn about the characters through this outside voice.

- **Omniscient:** A narrator who knows everything about all the characters; is all knowing.
- **Limited:** A narrator who is limited to the thoughts of one character.

In considering point of view we must ask ourselves the following questions:

1. Who tells the story?
2. From what position or angle does the narrator tell the story?
3. How close is the narrator to the action?
4. How reliable is the narrator?

First Person Point of View

The narrator participates in the action of the story (uses "I"). When reading stories in the first person, we need to realize that what the narrator is recounting might not be the objective truth. We should question the trustworthiness of the accounting.

Point of view in To Kill a Mockingbird

To Kill a Mockingbird is told in first person narrative (Scout). The narrative voice fluctuates between the child's point of view (telling the events as they happen), and the adult voice looking back on the childhood many years later. The child's naïve voice dominates the central plot.
