Your evolving philosophy should be based on your experiences, textbooks, research, field observations, reflections, course readings, and discussions, as well as other resources. You should examine various philosophies of education, including constructivism, and discuss how these philosophies impact your personal philosophy. The Portfolio II paper should exemplify growth in the understanding and articulation of your philosophy of education. One of the essential questions is: "How does my personal philosophy reflect the tenets of the Education Department's Conceptual Framework?"
