How Does a Chicken Hatch?

The hen is a female bird and the cockerel is a male bird. A hen and a cockerel mate and the hen will lay eggs. These eggs will hatch into chicks.

To begin with, the hen makes a nest for her eggs. Each day, the hen lays one egg in her nest. After ten days, there are ten eggs in the nest. This is called a clutch of eggs.

At this stage, the hen sits on her eggs to keep them warm. Inside each egg, a chick will soon begin to grow. If the eggs get cold, the chicks will die. During the incubation period, the eggs are turned so that they will be warm all over.



After 21 days, the chick is fully-developed and ready to hatch from the sack that protects the egg. Just long after, the chick uses its egg tooth to tap the shell. If the chick is unable to tap the shell, it will not hatch. Sometimes it makes a tiny hole in the shell.

At last, the shell breaks open and the chick comes out of the eggshell. If it is wet and very tired, it lies down to rest. Within a few hours, the chick can stand up and run about provided that it is not injured. Now it is safe and fluffy and ready to feed.

If the chick is healthy, it will grow up to be a hen or a cockerel. If it is a hen, it may mate with a cockerel and lay some eggs.



How Do Tadpoles Grow?

Frogs are cold-blooded amphibians. Amphibians are animals that can walk on land and can swim in water.

A mother frog lays about 4,000 eggs in a lake or pond. These eggs are very soft and have no shell.

After 3-6 weeks, tiny tadpoles emerge and swim around in order to find plants to feed on. The tadpoles still have gills so they can't get out of the water.



In time, the tadpoles start to grow legs. Firstly, the hind legs appear. The tadpoles start to look more like frogs, but are still a long way from full development.

Then, the lungs begin to develop and finally the front legs slowly appear. This enables the tadpoles to become more adventurous, allowing many of them to be eaten up by large fish and water insects.

After three months, the tadpoles' lungs are fully developed and the tadpoles can get out of the water and breathe. Their tails will shrink away and vanish.

The frogs are fully grown. During winter, the fully-grown frogs will hibernate at the bottom of the pond.



Do Seeds Grow?

Plants are living things. Most plants start from seeds. Plants need water, air and light in order to grow. Plant seeds are usually buried in soil.

Firstly, the seed cracks open and roots begin to grow. Roots suck water and nutrients from the soil.

After a few days, the stem begins to grow. As the stem grows thicker, leaves begin to grow.

Later, buds grow and develop into flowers. The flowers drop seeds on the ground. Sometimes the wind even blows the seeds elsewhere.

After the flowers die, the cycle starts again from the new seeds.



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Life Cycle of a Moth

A moth is an insect with two antennae and a pair of wings. Moths also have feelers.

Firstly, a female moth uses her antennae to help choose the right plant to lay her eggs on. After a few days, the eggs hatch and baby caterpillars come out. The baby caterpillars eat the leaves for nourishment. After they have finished eating their shell, they move on to the next stage.

Next, the caterpillar grows quickly. Soon, it starts to shed its skin. At between 11 and 12 days of age, it starts to make a pupa to live in. While the caterpillar is inside its pupa, its wings develop. Eventually, the pupa case will open and a lovely moth will come out.

Adult moths fit from plant to plant, feeding and growing. All moths have two sets of wings covered in tiny scales. They grow two eyes and big eye spots on their wings so that they can scare away predators. Their antennae are very sensitive. At the end of the cycle to begin again, the female must lay eggs on a leaf.
