From Berlin to Baghdad Hal Brands, 2021-12-14 On November 9 1989 a mob of jubilant Berliners dismantled the wall that had divided their city for nearly forty years this act of destruction anticipated the momentous demolition of the European communist system Within two years the nations of the former Eastern Bloc toppled their authoritarian regimes and the Soviet Union ceased to exist fading quietly into the shadows of twentieth century history and memory By the end of 1991 the United States and other Western nations celebrated the demise of their most feared enemy and reveled in the ideological vindication of capitalism and liberal democracy As author Hal Brands compellingly demonstrates however many American diplomats and politicians viewed the fall of the Soviet empire as a mixed blessing For more than four decades containment of communism provided the overriding goal of American foreign policy allowing generations of political leaders to build domestic consensus on this steady reliable foundation From Berlin to Baghdad incisively dissects the numerous unsuccessful attempts to devise a new grand foreign policy strategy that could match the moral clarity and political efficacy of containment Brands takes a fresh look at the key events and players in recent American history In the 1990s George H W Bush envisioned the United States as the guardian of a new world order and the Clinton administration sought the enlargement of America's political and economic influence However both presidents eventually came to accept albeit grudgingly that America's multifaceted roles responsibilities and objectives could not be reduced to a single fundamental principle During the early years of the George W Bush administration it appeared that the tragedies of 9 11 and the subsequent war on terror would provide the organizing principle lacking in U S foreign policy since the containment of communism became an outdated notion For a time most Americans were united in support of Bush's foreign policies and the military incursions into Afghanistan and Iraq As the swift invasions became grinding occupations however popular support for Bush's policies waned and the rubric of the war on terror lost much of its political and rhetorical cachet From Berlin to Baghdad charts the often onerous course of recent American foreign policy from the triumph of the fall of the Berlin Wall to the tragedies of 9 11 and beyond analyzing the nation's search for purpose in the face of the daunting complexities of the post Cold War world

Beyond Piggly Wiggly Lisa C. Tolbert, 2023-08 Patented in 1917 Piggly Wiggly was by far the most influential self service store of the early twentieth century Before 1940 it was the only self service chain with a national distribution network but it was neither the first nor the only version Beyond Piggly Wiggly reveals the

importance of Piggly Wiggly in the invention of self service and goes beyond the history of a single firm to explore the role of small business entrepreneurs who invented the first self service stores in a grassroots social process During the 1920s and 1930s a minority of enterprising grocers experimented with a wide variety of sometimes wacky design ideas for automating shopping They created specialized stores designed as enclosed retail systems that went far beyond open display techniques to construct unique physical and psychological advantages for automating salesmanship Beyond Piggly Wiggly offers the first perspective on the national scale of experimentation and connects the southern Jim Crow origins of self service to the national history of this mass retailing method Empirical analysis of store arrangements demonstrates how small stores that have previously been overlooked or undervalued as quaint anomalies were integral to the creation of supermarkets Ultimately self service was more than a business decision it was a fundamentally new social practice

Beyond Bakelite Joris Mercelis, 2020-03-24 The changing relationships between science and industry in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries illustrated by the career of the father of plastics The Belgian born American chemist inventor and entrepreneur Leo Baekeland 1863 1944 is best known for his invention of the first synthetic plastic his near namesake Bakelite which had applications ranging from electrical insulators to Art Deco jewelry Toward the end of his career Baekeland was called the father of plastics given credit for the establishment of a sector to which many other researchers inventors and firms inside and outside the United States had also made significant contributions In Beyond Bakelite Joris Mercelis examines Baekeland s career using it as a lens through which to view the changing relationships between science and industry on both sides of the Atlantic in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries He gives special attention to the intellectual property strategies and scientific entrepreneurship of the period making clear their relevance to contemporary concerns Mercelis describes the growth of what he terms the science industry nexus and the developing interdependence of science and industry After examining Baekeland s emergence as a pragmatic innovator and leader in scientific circles Mercelis analyzes Baekeland s international and domestic IP strategies and his efforts to reform the US patent system his dual roles as scientist and industrialist the importance of theoretical knowledge to the science industry nexus and the American Bakelite companies research and development practices technically oriented sales approach and remuneration schemes Mercelis argues that the expansion and transformation of the science industry nexus shaped the careers and legacies of Baekeland and many of his contemporaries

Germany He joined the German army in 1910 and served with distinction in World War I After the war he remained in the military and rose through the ranks In 1940 he was given command of the Afrika Korps a German expeditionary force sent to North Africa to aid the Italian army Rommel quickly proved to be a brilliant military commander He led the Afrika Korps to a series of victories against the British culminating in the capture of Tobruk in June 1942 Rommel s successes in North Africa made him a national hero in Germany and earned him the nickname Desert Fox However Rommel s luck eventually ran out In October 1942 the British launched a massive offensive against the Afrika Korps at El Alamein Rommel was forced to retreat and eventually evacuate his troops from North Africa In 1944 Rommel was given command of the German forces defending Normandy against the Allied invasion He was tasked with holding the Allies at bay long enough for the Germans to build up their defenses in France Rommel knew that the odds were stacked against him but he was determined to do his duty The Allies landed in Normandy on June 6 1944 Rommel s forces fought bravely but they were outnumbered and outgunned After a month of fighting Rommel was forced to retreat The Allies liberated Paris in August 1944 and Rommel was dismissed from his command Rommel was implicated in the July 20 plot to assassinate Hitler and he was forced to commit suicide in October 1944 He was 53 years old This book is the definitive biography of Erwin Rommel It is a must read for anyone interested in military history World War II or the life of one of the most fascinating figures of the 20th century If you like this book write a review

In such disparate places as New York City, the rural South, and the burgeoning metropolis of Miami, these unconventional architectural photographers observed buildings as deeply connected to their context. Whereas Stieglitz captured New York as the quintessential modern urban landscape in the period, the South was its opposite, a land supposedly frozen in the past. Yet just as this myth of the Old South crystallized in photographs like Johnston's, a New South shaped by popular culture and modern industry arose. Miami embodied both of these visions. In Wolcott's work, agricultural fields where stoop labor persisted were juxtaposed with Art Deco hotels, a popular modernism of the machine age that remade Miami Beach into a miniaturized Manhattan on the beach. *Beyond the Architect's Eye* is a groundbreaking study that melds histories of American art, cities, and architecture with visual studies of landscape photography and cultural geography.
