

The Test of Narrative Language-2 is a standardized measure administered to children ages 4-0 through 15-11 to assess the ability to answer literal and inferential comprehension questions about a narrative presented orally and how well children use language in narrative discourse. The TNL-2 has three formats: a script, a personal narrative, and a fictional narrative. The child is provided with pictures for each story format and is either told a story followed by a series of comprehension questions, asked to complete a story retell, or they create their own story. Below is a description of **XX's** performance on each story:

In the first story task, the child is presented with a story about a family that goes to McDonald's.
