*Operational Art Requirements in the Korean War* Command and Staff College, 2014-10-22 Historical examples are an expedient way to develop an understanding of operational art theory and concepts A historical illustration of both operational success and failure is the Korean War Several aspects of the Korean War remain relevant to operational art in contemporary conflicts It had a complex and evolving strategy a dramatic interplay of tactical success and failures uncertainty and miscalculation shortages of means to accomplish ends and the difficult challenge to set the conditions for a satisfactory conclusion to the conflict An examination of three distinct operational periods in the Korean War using the requirements of operational art as described in Army Doctrinal Publication 3-0 Unified Land Operations will reveal whether operational art was a factor in success or failure This monograph argues that the commander met the requirements for operational art in two of the three periods observed Consequently these two phases resulted in operational success and contributed to the strategic aim Additionally this monograph will show the design and execution of operations the requirements of operational art is a prerequisite for success in the pursuit of strategic objectives

**Operational Art In The Korean War: A Comparison Between General MacArthur And General Walker** Major Remco van Ingen, 2015-11-06 This monograph addresses operational art during a specific period of the Korean War Both General Walton Walker and General Douglas MacArthur developed operational approaches to unify Korea when the decision was made to cross the 38th parallel into North Korea General MacArthur's approach used two major ground commands was more daring but more complicated General Walker on the other hand suggested an approach under one unified ground commander seemed more methodical and less daring Ultimately General MacArthur's approach was the one executed The X Corps amphibious assault did not bring the anticipated result The out loading of X Corps in preparation for the assault took longer than anticipated and the enemy had mined the sea approaches to Wonsan These two factors combined with an unsynchronized ground attack by I ROK Corps eliminated the chance of a successful envelopment The monograph provides insight in the relationship between the commander's personality his previous operational experiences and his preference for a particular type of operational approach

Korean War took place over a three year period from 25 June 1950 to 27 July 1953 The first year experienced the major operations of the entire war and the remaining two years of the war basically resulted in a stalemate along the 38th Parallel until the armistice The period of the Korean War was a delicate time in United States history and the war was part of a larger global problem facing the country with regards to the expansion of communism General of the Army Omar Nelson Bradley served as the first Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 16 August 1949 to 15 August 1953 During this time in his career his duty as Chairman overlapped with the Korean War from the initial invasion on 25 June 1950 to the signing of the armistice on July 1953 Bradley s position as Chairman was part of the modern day Department of Defense unifying the service chiefs of the armed forces The Chairman position was the senior military advisor to the President of the United States and the Secretary of Defense During Bradley s four year term in this position he served under both Presidents Harry S Truman and Dwight D Eisenhower Bradley also served with the Secretaries of Defense Louis Johnson George Marshall and Robert Lovett During the Korean War General of the Army Douglas MacArthur and General Matthew Ridgway served as the Far East Commanders

**Military Review** ,2012 *Origins of the North Korean Garrison State* Youngjun Kim,2017-08-09 This book investigates the origins of the North Korean garrison state by examining the development of the Korean People s Army and the legacies of the Korean War Despite its significance there are very few books on the Korean People s Army with North Korean primary sources being difficult to access This book however draws on North Korean documents and North Korean veterans testimonies and demonstrates how the Korean People s Army and the Korean War shaped North Korea into a closed militarized and xenophobic garrison state and made North Korea seek Juche Self Reliance ideology and weapons of mass destruction This book maintains that the youth and lower classes in North Korea considered the Korean People s Army as a positive opportunity for upward social mobility As a result the North Korean regime secured its legitimacy by establishing a new class of social elites wherein they offered career advancements for persons who had little standing and few opportunities under the preceding Japanese dominated regime These new elites from poor working and peasant families became the core supporters of the North Korean regime today In addition this book argues that in the aftermath of the Korean War a culture of victimization was established among North Koreans which allowed Kim Il Sung to use this culture of fear to build and maintain the garrison state Thus this work illustrates how the North Korean regime has garnered popular support for the continuation of a militarized state despite the great hardships the people are suffering This book will be of much interest to students of North Korea the Korean War Asian politics Cold War Studies military and strategic studies and international history
