## Rocks and Minerals:

**Mineral:** material that is found in Earth (natural substances that have never been alive)

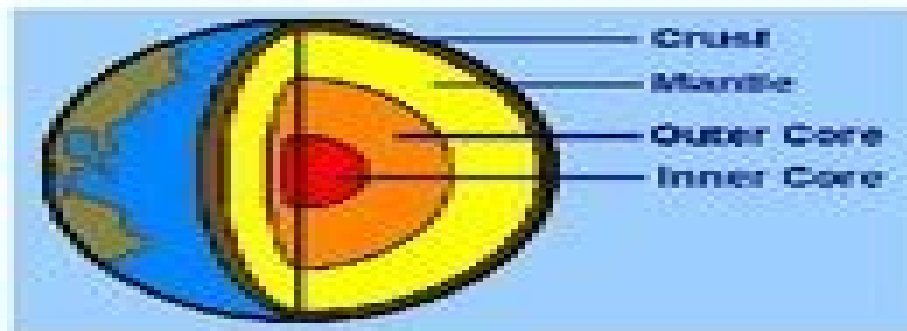
**Property of Minerals:**

- Luster (how shiny it is)
- Color and Streak (color of the mineral when it becomes powder in streak)
  - Hardness
    - o Mohs' Hardness Scale is used
    - o Talc- hardness of 1 (softest mineral)
    - o Diamond- hardness of 10 (hardest mineral)
- Cleavage (when a mineral splits along flat surfaces)
- Nonmetallic mineral- looks dull (determined by luster, hardness, color, cleavage, other properties)
- Metallic mineral- shiny (determined by color, streak, other properties)

**Three Types of Rocks:**

1. **Igneous:** form when molten (magma) rock from deep below Earth's surface cools and hardens. (Granite, Basalt, Gneiss)
2. **Metamorphic:** new rock that forms when existing rocks are changed by heat and pressure beneath Earth's surface (Limestone changes to Marble, Granite changes to Gneiss)
3. **Sedimentary:** forms when sand, particles of rock, bits of soil, and bits of once-living things are pressed together and hardened. (Conglomerate, Limestone, Shale)
