

Elizabeth steps over the dragon, goes into the cave, and rescues Prince Ronald. Astonished by his reaction, she tells him his clothes are pretty and his hair is tidy, but in fact, he's a bum. They don't get married after all.

Her parents suggest she explore their flat and to stop bothering them. This is how Coraline discovers a mysterious door that leads to a brick wall in the drawing room. At night, this door opens into a corridor that leads to an alternate version of her house. Inside are alternate versions of her parents and other inhabitants. The only difference is these other people have buttons for eyes. At first, Coraline is met with excitement, adventure, and attention.
