Calligraphy Typewriters Larry Eigner, 2017-03-21 The first and only single volume collection of Larry Eigner's most significant poems gathering in one place the most celebrated of the several thousand poems that constitute his remarkable life's work Larry Eigner began writing poetry at age eight and was first published at age nine Revered by poets and artists across a broad spectrum of generations and schools Eigner's remarkably moving poetry was created through enormous effort because of severe physical disabilities he produced his texts by typing with only one index finger and thumb on a 1940 Royal manual typewriter creating a body of work that is unparalleled in its originality Calligraphy Typewriters showcases the most celebrated of Eigner's several thousand poems which are an important part of the Black Mountain Projectivist movement that began in the 1950s and which remain a primary inspiration for many younger writers including those in the Language movement that began in the 1970s In its two sections Swampscott and Berkeley named for the two locales where Eigner lived and worked the volume traces his fantastic perception of the ordinary and his zeal for language Eigner's use of visual space metaphor and description provide fascinating insights into both his own life and the world that surrounded him This volume maintains the distinctive visual spacing of his original typescripts reminders of his method aesthetic sensibility and creative ability to compose on the typewriter A collection that reimagines the ordinary Calligraphy Typewriters is the definitive selection of Eigner's poems and will serve well not only poets and students of poetry but readers and writers of every vein

The Age of Astonishment Bill Morris, 2022-04-05 An acclaimed journalist and novelist makes history personal painting a rich and vivid portrait of the time when America became modern by tracing the life of one man who lived through it It all began with a black and white family snapshot of a distinguished elderly gentleman with a fine head of spun sugar hair He was wearing round tortoise shell glasses a three piece suit and an expression of delight mixed with terror for on his right knee he was balancing a swaddled infant with a bewildered look The baby is Bill Morris the man is his father's father John Morris That photo taken in November 1952 the month the United States detonated the first hydrogen bomb a weapon a thousand times more powerful than the atom bombs that incinerated Hiroshima and Nagasaki Three years later John Morris died at the age of 92 Bill has no memories of the man but even as a boy he found himself marveling at the changes John must have witnessed and experienced in his long lifetime He was born into a slave owning Virginia family during the Civil War and he died at the peak of the Cold War At the time of his birth the dominant technologies were the steam engine and the telegraph He grew up in a world lit by kerosene and candles he traveled by foot and horseback and wagon and drank water hauled from a well He would live through Reconstruction women's suffrage Prohibition the Great Depression two world wars the Korean War and the advent of nuclear weapons Though he was from a slave owning family he changed his views as he grew into adulthood and would unhappily witness the horrors of Jim Crow and work against it Fluent in German he would witness Hitler's rise to power just one of the unimaginable occurrences of his time that suddenly

Bodies on the Line Raphael Allison, 2014-12-01 *Bodies on the Line* offers the first sustained study of the poetry reading in its most formative period, the 1960s. Raphael Allison closely examines a vast archive of audio recordings of several key postwar American poets to explore the social and literary context of the sixties poetry reading, which is characterized by contrasting, differing styles of performance: the humanist style and the skeptical strain. The humanist style, made mainstream by the Beats and their imitators, is characterized by faith in the power of presence, emotional communion, and affect. The skeptical strain emphasizes openness of interpretation and multivalent meaning, a lack of stability or consistency, and ironic detachment. By comparing these two dominant styles of reading, Allison argues that attention to sixties poetry readings reveals poets struggling between the kind of immediacy and presence that readings suggested and a private retreat from such performance-based publicity, one centered on the text itself. Recordings of Robert Frost, Charles Olson, Gwendolyn Brooks, Larry Eigner, and William Carlos Williams, all of whom emphasized voice, breath, and spoken language and who were inveterate professional readers in the sixties, expose this struggle in often surprising ways. In deconstructing assertions about the role and importance of the poetry reading during this period, Allison reveals just how dramatic, political, and contentious poetry readings could be. By discussing how to hear as well as read poetry, *Bodies on the Line* offers startling new vantage points from which to understand American poetry since the 1960s, as both performance and text.
