1. Superheroes, with their incredible powers and daring exploits, have always crowded the pages of comic books but are now reaching an even wider audience via the big screen. There are so many films featuring such amazing characters as Spider-Man and the Hulk either out now, preparing sequels or just around the corner that it can be said that we appear to be in the middle of the age of the superhero.



2. The first films, dating from the 1930s can still be watchable now although, of course, their special effects were practically non-existent. The first superheroes did not have superhuman qualities but fought against evil using their intelligence, highly trained physical capabilities and various gadgets and allies. Superman himself was the first to have super strength and special powers and the original film of his adventures came out in 1948.



3. Marvel Comics in the 1960s created a new generation of heroes, many of whom have appeared in increasingly technologically sophisticated films up to the present day. Female superheroes also began to arrive on the scene – Batgirl was one of the first in 1966 and in 1976 came one of the most famous of all: Wonder Woman. Superman's cousin Supergirl appeared in 1984 and Lara Croft has been the first heroine to come not from comic books but from computer graphics.



4. Many fine actors are now happy to accept roles in this genre that was once seen as only really aimed at children. Spider-Man was the biggest blockbuster of 2002 and audiences seem ready for even more super action films. It will be interesting to see who will be the next superhero to fill our screens...and our imaginations.
