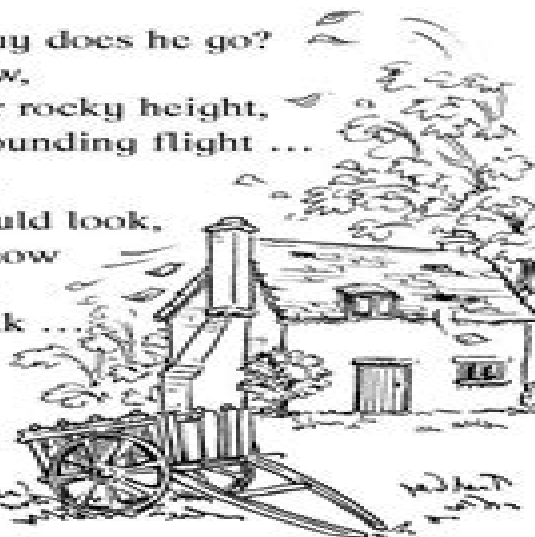


Figurative language
