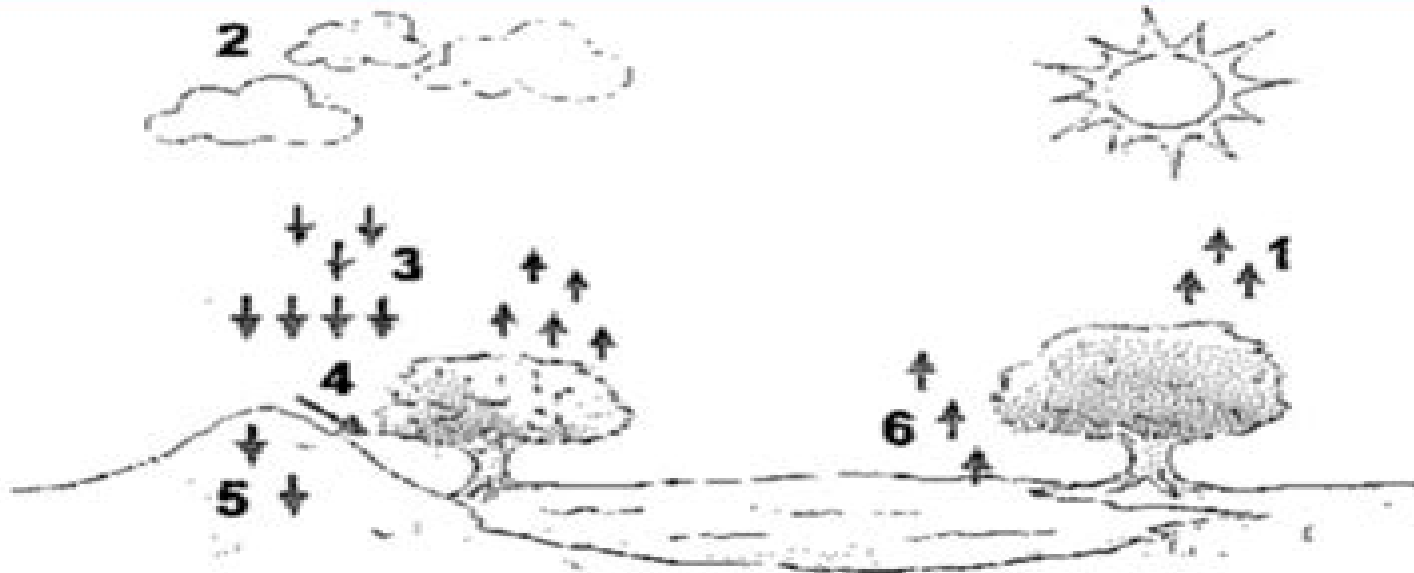

**The Southern Manifesto** John Kyle Day, 2014-07-09 On March 13 1956 ninety nine members of the United States Congress promulgated the Declaration of Constitutional Principles popularly known as the Southern Manifesto Reprinted here the Southern Manifesto formally stated opposition to the landmark United State Supreme Court decision *Brown v Board of Education* and the emergent civil rights movement This statement allowed the white South to prevent *Brown* s immediate full scale implementation and for nearly two decades set the slothful timetable and glacial pace of public school desegregation The Southern Manifesto also provided the Southern Congressional Delegation with the means to stymie federal voting rights legislation so that the dismantling of Jim Crow could be managed largely on white southern terms In the wake of the *Brown* decision that declared public school segregation unconstitutional seminal events in the early stages of the civil rights movement like the Emmett Till lynching the Montgomery bus boycott and the Autherine Lucy riots at the University of Alabama brought the struggle for black freedom to national attention Orchestrated by United States Senator Richard Brevard Russell Jr of Georgia the Southern Congressional Delegation in general and the United States Senate s Southern Caucus in particular fought vigorously and successfully to counter the initial successes of civil rights workers and maintain Jim Crow The South s defense of white supremacy culminated with this most notorious statement of opposition to desegregation The Southern Manifesto Massive Resistance and the Fight to Preserve Segregation narrates this single worst episode of racial demagoguery in modern American political history and considers the statement s impact upon both the struggle for black freedom and the larger racial dynamics of postwar America Pathogens for War Donald H. **Counting the Public In** Douglas C. Foyle, 1999-05-06 Does the public alter American foreign policy choices or does the government change public opinion to support its policies In this detailed study Douglas Foyle demonstrates that the differing influence of public opinion is mediated in large part through each president's beliefs about the value and significance of public opinion Using archival collections and public sources Foyle examines the beliefs of all the post World War II presidents in addition to the foreign policy decisions of Presidents Dwight Eisenhower Jimmy Carter Ronald Reagan George Bush and Bill Clinton He finds that some presidents are relatively open to public opinion while others hold beliefs that cause them to ignore the public's view Several orientations toward public opinion are posited the delegate Clinton favors public input and seeks its support the executor Carter believes public input is desirable but its support is not necessary the pragmatist Eisenhower Bush does not seek public input in crafting policy but sees public support as necessary and finally the guardian Reagan neither seeks public input nor requires public support The book examines the public's influence through case studies regarding decisions on the Formosa Straits crisis intervention at Dien Bien Phu the Sputnik launch the New Look defense strategy the Panama Canal Treaties the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan the Strategic Defense Initiative the Beirut Marine barracks bombing German reunification the Gulf War intervention in Somalia and intervention in Bosnia

McAndrews, 2014-05-15 Roman Catholics constitute the most populous religious denomination in the United States comprising one in four Americans With the election of John F Kennedy as president in 1960 they attained a political prominence to match their rapidly ascending socioeconomic and cultural profile From Vietnam to Iraq the civil rights movement to federal funding for faith based initiatives and from birth control to abortion Catholics have won at least as often as they have lost *What They Wished For* by Lawrence J McAndrews traces the role of American Catholics in presidential policies and politics from 1960 until 2004 Though divided by race class gender and party Catholics have influenced issues of war and peace social justice and life and death among modern presidents in a profound way starting with the election of President Kennedy and expanding their influence through the intervening years with subsequent presidents McAndrews shows that American Catholics led by their bishops and in some cases their pope have been remarkably successful in shaping the political dialogue and at helping to effect policy outcomes inside and outside of Washington Indeed although they opened this era by helping to elect one of their own Catholic voters have gained so much influence and have become so secure in their socioeconomic status and so confident in their political standing that they closed the era by rejecting one of their own voting for George W Bush over John Kerry in 2004 *In Sputnik's Shadow* Zuoyue Wang, 2009 *In Sputnik's Shadow* traces the rise and fall of the President's Science Advisory Committee from its ascendance under Eisenhower to its demise during the Nixon years Zuoyue Wang examines key turning points during the twentieth century including the beginning of the Cold War the debates over nuclear weapons the Sputnik crisis in 1957 the struggle over the Vietnam War and the eventual end of the Cold War showing how the involvement of scientists in executive policymaking evolved over time and brings new insights to the intellectual social and cultural histories of the era
