Religion, Spirituality and Everyday Practice Giuseppe Giordan, William H. Swatos, Jr., 2011-08-14 The current generation of young adults at least in the Western world has shown a marked tendency toward a preference for describing themselves as spiritual as contrasted to religious This book seeks to examine the possible meanings and consequences associated with this contrast in terms of the similarities and differences that affect those who use these terms with respect to the everyday practices that they themselves employ or believe should follow from being self defined as religious or spiritual or not The several chapters in this volume take up the religious spiritual contrast specifically through investigations into practice In what ways do people who claim to be religious or spiritual define these self images as manifest in their own lives How on a daily basis does a person who considers himself or herself religious or spiritual live out that self image in specific ways that she or he can describe to others even if not share with others Are there ways that being spiritual can involve religion or ways that being religious can involve spirituality and if so how do these differ from concepts in prior eras e g Ignatian spirituality Orthodox spirituality Anglican spirituality etc We also explore if there are institutions of spiritual practice to which those who term themselves spiritual turn or if the difference implied by these terms may instead be between institutionalized and de institutionalized expressions of practice including but not limited to self spiritualities

Lived Religion Meredith B McGuire, 2008-08-22 How can we grasp the complex religious lives of individuals such as Peter an ordained Protestant minister who has little attachment to any church but centers his highly committed religious practice on peace and justice activism Or Hannah a devout Jew whose rich spiritual life revolves around her women s spirituality group and the daily practice of meditative dance Or Laura who identifies as Catholic but rarely attends Mass and engages daily in Buddhist style meditation at her home altar arranged with symbols of Mexican American popular religion Diverse religious practices such as these have long baffled scholars whose research often starts with the assumption that individuals commit or refuse to commit to an entire institutionally framed package of beliefs and practices Meredith McGuire points the way forward toward a new way of understanding religion She argues that scholars must study religion not as it is defined by religious organizations but as it is actually lived in people s everyday lives Drawing on her own extensive fieldwork as well as recent work by others McGuire explores the many seemingly mundane ways that individuals practice their religions and develop their spiritual lives By examining the many eclectic and creative practices of body mind emotion and spirit that have been invisible to researchers she offers a fuller and more nuanced understanding of contemporary religion

Lived Religion in Latin America Gustavo Morello, S.J., 2021-07-30 What does the practice of religion look like in Latin American today In this book which examines religious practice in three Latin American cities Lima Per C rdoba Argentina and Montevideo Uruguay Gustavo Morello reveals the influence of modernity on average citizens cultural practices Technological development the dynamics of capitalism the specialization of spheres of knowledge all these aspects of modernity were thought to diminish the importance of religion Yet Morello argues if we look at religion as ordinary Latin Americans practice it we discover that modernity has not diminished religion but transformed it creating what Morello calls

enchanted modernity In Latin America there is more religion than secularists expect but of a different kind than religious leaders would wish Morello explores how urban contemporary Latin Americans both believers and non believers from different social classes and religious affiliations experience transcendence in everyday life Using semi structured interviews with 254 individuals in three cities with shifting religious landscapes and different cultural histories Morello highlights the diversity within Latin America exploring societies that are understudied and examining a broad array of religious traditions nones agnostics non affiliated atheist Catholics Evangelicals including mainstream Protestants Pentecostals neo Evangelicals and other traditions including Jews Muslims Mormons African derived traditions and Buddhists Morello emphasizes elements nuances and dynamics that have previously been overlooked and that can enrich the study of religion other non western societies The book seeks to contribute to a critical theory of contemporary religion one that is not centered in the North Atlantic world and that takes seriously the voices of the Latin American people **Pilgrimage and Political Economy**

Contemporary Spiritualities Stefania Palmisano, Nicola Pannofino, 2020-11-01 Contemporary alternative spirituality as studied by sociologists is usually seen as a recent phenomenon dating from the 1960s and 1970s However when viewed from a longer term perspective this form of religious expression is actually seen to reintroduce concepts that recur throughout Western cultural history This book argues therefore that spirituality in the 21st Century actually shares many of the same characteristics as Classical Mediaeval

Renaissance and Modern spiritualities It is neither entirely new nor is it clearly alternative to more established religions The book is divided into two parts The first sets out the context in which contemporary alternative spirituality has formed charting its development as an academic term and a social phenomenon The second part looks at how these two elements have developed in countries that are historically Catholic focussing on specific examples in contemporary Italy spiritualities based on the sacralisation of nature those concerned with health and wellbeing and those which are fascinated by mystery Catholic majority countries are particularly interesting in this instance as the Catholic Church has a unique cultural hegemony with which to compare alternative spiritual practices It concludes that spirituality if framed in a longer historical perspective is a way of acting and seeing the world which was built and continues to be built upon complex relations with various contradictory sources of authority such as religion magic thinking secularism rationalism various spheres of lay culture This is a bold take on the spirituality milieu and as such will be of great interest to scholars of Religious Studies working on the sociology of religion contemporary spirituality and the rise of the spiritual but not religious

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
