Observing Human Traits Lab



Background: Physical traits are observable characteristics that are determined by genes. Genes are specific segments of DNA located on chromosomes that code for a particular trait. Most genes have two or more variations called alleles. Some alleles are dominant over others and dominant alleles will be expressed (an organism's phenotype or physical appearance) over recessive alleles. Recessive alleles may be present in an organism but expression is masked in the presence of a dominant allele for the same gene. Recessive traits are only expressed when there are two recessive alleles present in the genotype (DNA code).

Keep in mind that it's not always quite this simple. There are other factors that influence expression, and most traits have several genes that influence them. This is an introduction to dominant and recessive traits. Let's get started!
