explores the power of story to forge ancestral and kinship ties between the Din and Dene across time and space through re-storying of relations A complex Din worldview and philosophy that cannot be defined with one word in the English language H zh means to continually strive for harmony beauty balance peace and happiness but most importantly the Din have a right to it

**Alien Visions** Margaret Ziolkowski, 2005 There are many parallels and some revealing differences in the encounter between on the one hand the Americans and various Indian tribes and on the other the Russians and some of the peoples of the Caucasus and Siberia The enduring cultural consequences of these encounters provide a fruitful area of inquiry for the comparative examination of national images in literatures The major focus on this study is the perceptions and literary portrayal of the Chechens by the Russians and the Navajos by the Americans Both the Chechen in Russian literature and the Navajo in American literature are often constructs images derived from a potent combination of prejudices and received assumptions In each case a relatively sizable corpus of writings produced over a century or longer exemplifies or attempts to counter persistent and influential modes of cultural stereotyping The diachronic analysis of the portrayal of either the Chechens or the Navajos illuminates patterns of prejudice that have immense implications for both popular and high culture The juxtaposition of the discussion of the two groups as they have been treated in Russian and American literature can deepen our understanding of the commonalities present in attempted cultural domination or ethnic idealization Margaret Ziolkowski is Professor of Russian at Miami University Ohio

**Bitter Water** Malcolm D. Benally, 2011-05-15 Many know that the removal and relocation of Indigenous peoples from traditional lands is a part of the United States colonial past but few know that in an expansive corner of northeastern Arizona the saga continues The 1974 Settlement Act officially divided a reservation established almost a century earlier between the Din Navajo and the Hopi and legally granted the contested land to the Hopi To date the U S government has relocated between 12 000 and 14 000 Din from Hopi Partitioned Lands and the Din both there and elsewhere continue to live with the legacy of this relocation Bitter Water presents the narratives of four Din women who have resisted removal but who have watched as their communities and lifeways have changed dramatically The book based on 25 hours of filmed personal testimony features the women s candid discussions of their efforts to carry on a traditional way of life in a contemporary world that includes relocation and partitioned lands encroaching Western values and culture and devastating mineral extraction and development in the Black Mesa region of Arizona Though their accounts are framed by insightful writings by both Benally and Din historian Jennifer Nez Denetdale Benally lets the stories of the four women elders speak for themselves Scholars media and other outsiders have all told their versions of this story but this is the first book that centers on the stories of women who have lived it in their own words in Navajo as well as the English translation The result is a living history of a contested cultural landscape and the unique worldview of women determined to maintain their traditions and lifeways which are so intimately connected to the land This book is more than a collection of stories poetry and prose It is a chronicle of resistance as spoken from the hearts of those who have lived it

Begay and the Navajo Code Talkers* Alysa Landry,2023-03-07 The life story of this World War II Navajo Code Talker introduces middle grade readers to an unforgettable person and offers a close perspective on aspects of Navajo or Din history and culture Thomas H Begay was one of the young Navajo men who during World War II invented and used a secret unbreakable communications code based on their native Din language to help win the war in the Pacific Although the book includes anecdotes from other code talkers its central narrative revolves around Begay It tells his story from his birth near the Navajo reservation his childhood spent herding sheep his adolescence in federally mandated boarding schools and ultimately his decision to enlist in the US Marine Corps Alysa Landry relies heavily on interviews with Begay who as of this writing is in his late nineties and one of only three surviving code talkers Begay's own voice and sense of humor make this book particularly significant in that it is the only Code Talker biography for young readers told from a soldier's perspective Begay was involved with the book every step of the way granting Landry unlimited access to his military documents personal photos and oral history Additionally Begay's family contributed by reading and fact checking the manuscript This truly is a unique collaborative project
