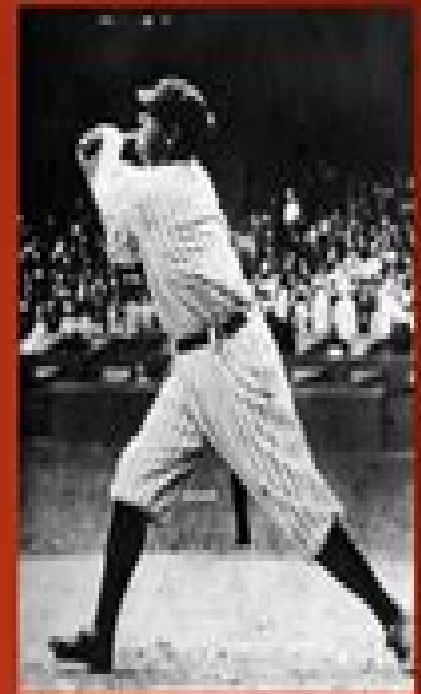

Most importantly, based on the assumption that committing adultery fulfills different functions in the novel, it presents Daisy Buchanan's and Myrtle Wilson's motivations pushing them to do it. *The Great Gatsby* seems to tell a story about a typified American Dream: a young man who was able to escape poverty and living a high-class lifestyle. But after all, it cannot be easily determined if it is a story that represents the American Dream or if the Dream he had changed into a Nightmare. The third text presents the American Nightmare in the novel with specific symbols that play an important role in his failure and the price he had to pay for his dream. Is Gatsby's economic success nevertheless a realization of the American Dream? It is important to ask that question because often *The Great Gatsby* is mainly associated with the American Dream and its typical lifestyle. How did Gatsby make his way up to the top? And how important is wealth, success, and his social status really in his opinion? In the fourth text, those questions will be given a closer look at.
