Generalised anxiety disorder - Cognitive behavioural therapy, applied relaxation, drug treatment, combined interventions, self help groups

Panic disorder - Cognitive behavioural therapy, antidepressants, self help groups

Obsessive-computaive disorder - Cognitive behavioural therapy (including exposure
and response prevention), antidepressants, combined interventions and case
management, self help groups

Post-traumatic stress disorder - Trauma focused cognitive behavioural therapy, eye movement desensitisation and reprocessing, drug treatment

All disorders - Support groups, educational and employment support services; befriending, rehabilitation programmes; referral for further assessment and interventions
