Initial images associated with the slave and indentured worker from the locations and legacies associated with plantation economies have been usurped by visual representations emerging from struggles for social, political, and cultural autonomy. Contemporary visual artists engaging with the Caribbean as a 21st century globalised space have focused on visually re-imagining historical material and events as memories, histories, and dreamscapes. Creole in the Archive uses photographic analysis to explore portraits, postcards, and social documentation of the colonial worker between 1850 and 1960, and contemporary, often digital, visual art by post-independent postcolonial Caribbean artists.
