Ethical Issues Raised

The case study presents a myriad of ethical issues concerning the handling and treatment issues in the case. Amos a high school student in the same school, level, and year underwent discriminative treatment based on the location he resided in despite being a student in the same school to the students that received treatment. Some of the students with a similar illness were admitted at the facility whose increase led to the insufficiency of the medical supplies thus leading to the limiting of the patients up for treatment. Amos was denied medical services on the point that he was not a boarding within the facility of the school which led to his subsequent suffering and eventual death. The case raises serious ethical challenges on the side of the medical professionals who are bound by ethical standards not to discriminate patients while dispensing their duties.

Basic Principles of Medical Ethics

The medical ethics ride on the four basic principles such as autonomy, beneficence, non-maleficence, and justice all related toward the issues of fairness, respect, and honesty. The principle of justice dictates that professionals should try and be as fair as possible whenever dispensing treatment to patients and handling medical resources related to patient care (Berglund, 2012). In this respect, one should be able to justify their actions in every situation. Amos suffered a victim of lack of justice, a principle expected to be observed and kept close to the heart of medical professionals. The aspect of fair treatment and proper use of resources did not occur thus leaving Amos, a student in the same school to suffer from cholera leading to his death. The medical professional ought to have given him medication despite his residence in a
