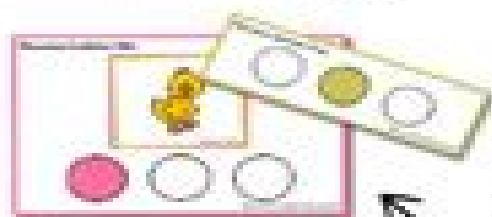
WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?
