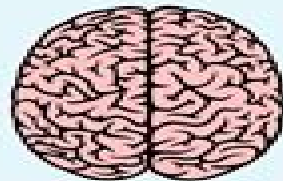

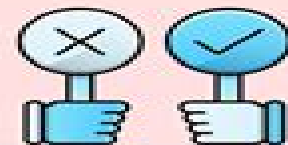

not limited to medical education and employment discrimination. These attitudes can be built into society at a systemic level and influence policies that govern access to supports and our communities. Additionally, autism stigma and prejudice against autistic people, such as stereotypical portrayals of autistic people in media and the language we use to describe autistic people, can be invalidating to a person's autistic identity and to autistic culture. Further, the impacts of stigma and prejudice can be internalized by autistic individuals, which may not only have poor effects on their wellbeing but also increase the want and/or need to mask or camouflage to pass as non-autistic. Masking or camouflaging can reduce a person's sense of belonging, self-esteem, sense of self-worth, and close relationships, all of which are associated with poor outcomes. It can also lead to avoidance of opportunities such as connection with other autistic individuals that could increase quality of life. This Research Topic aims to showcase evidence on why the stigma surrounding autism and the prejudice against autistic people are so detrimental.
