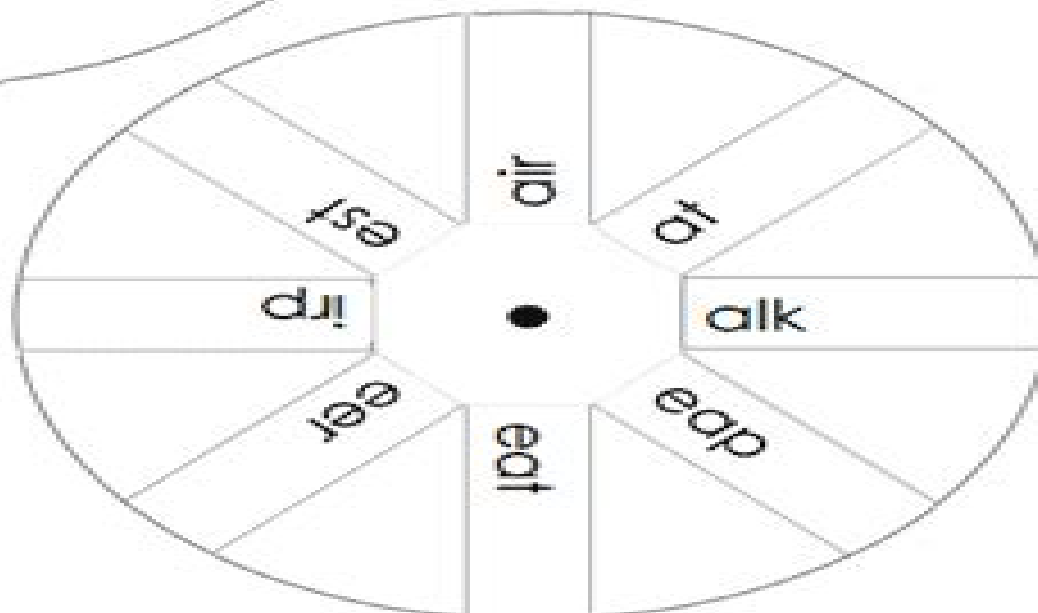
## DIRECTIONS
