Write opinion pieces on topics or texts, write informative/explanatory texts, compare first and revised drafts & more!

## WRITING AN OPINION TEXT

An opinion text tells thoughts or feelings about a topic.

A good opinion text includes:

- an introduction, body, and conclusion
- a statement of a belief or judgment
- reasons that support the belief or judgment
- linking words and phrases to connect the opinion and reasons

An opinion text might also include:

- a statement to explain an action the writer expects the reader to take

EX: People should recycle.

People should work on community projects.

- a statement to explain an action the writer expects the reader not to take

EX: People should not throw trash into lakes.

People should not eat unhealthy food.

Examples of opinion writing include:

- opinion texts
- letters or emails to editors of magazines or newspapers

### Frame Your Text

Introduce Your Topic **W.E.B. DUBOIS**

- Tell the readers your topic in the introduction to your text.
  - Make your topic clear. This helps the readers understand your opinion.
  - Tell your readers why the topic and opinion are important. This helps readers understand why you're writing about the topic. It also helps readers understand why you believe the opinion.
- Make your introduction interesting. This makes the reader want to keep reading.

Useless, general topic

There are lots of problems people can work to fix.

Clear, interesting topic

Water pollution is a serious problem that people can solve together.

### Planning in Action Use a Graphic Organizer to Brainstorm Topics

Your assignment might give you a specific topic. But many assignments give a general topic. Then you must think of a specific topic of your own. You can begin this work with a topic web. You can use a topic web for an opinion text or for other types of writing, including narrative and informative texts.

Start with the general topic or idea in the assignment. Then use a web to come up with ideas. Write every idea that comes to mind. Then look at all your ideas and choose one of the topics. This is a topic web completed by a student.

### State an Opinion **W.E.B. DUBOIS**

Your opinion is your viewpoint about an issue. How do you feel about the issue? What do you think about the issue? This is your opinion.

- You will often include the word *should* when you express an opinion.

EX: People *should* recycle.

Students *should* be part of community service projects.

- But it's not always necessary to include the word *should* when you express an opinion.

EX: Our school is the *best* school in the city.

Spring is my *favorite* season.

It's important to know the difference between a statement of fact and a statement of opinion.

- A statement of fact *can* be proven true or false.

EX: The height of the Empire State Building is 1,250 feet (381 m).

The name of our school is Kelly Ride Middle School.

- A statement of opinion *cannot* be proven true or false.

EX: The Empire State Building is the most beautiful building in New York.

Our school is the greatest school in the city.

**Statement of Fact**  
*can* be proven true or false

The capital of California is Sacramento.

There are five flowers in the bouquet.

Our teacher has a desk in our classroom.

There is a soccer field on our playground.

**Statement of Opinion**  
*cannot* be proven true or false

California is the best state in the country.

This is the prettiest bouquet ever!

Our classroom is the nicest in the school.

Soccer is the hardest sport to play.

**What should you do after you write the opinion for your text?**  
**Check the statement you have written.**  
**Can the statement be proven true or false?**

If yes, you have written a fact. You have not written an opinion. Try again.

If not, good work! You have written an opinion.

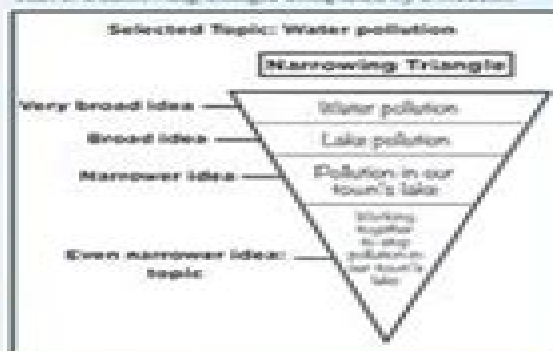

### Planning in Action Use a Narrowing Triangle to Narrow the Topic

A web can help you think of topics related to a general idea. But the topic from your web might be very broad. This means you'll need to narrow your topic to an opinion. You can use a narrowing triangle to do this for an opinion text or for other types of writing. Begin with the broad topic at the top of the narrowing triangle. Then narrow the topic more and more until you have the opinion to use for your text. This is a narrowing triangle completed by a student.
