The Unique Characteristics of the Paleolithic Era

The Paleolithic Era, also known as the Old Stone Age, was a time when early humans lived as hunter-gatherers. This period, lasting from about 2.5 million years ago to roughly 10,000 BCE, is considered some of the most important developments in human history.

One of the defining characteristics of the Paleolithic Era was the nomadic lifestyle. Early humans moved from place to place, following herds of animals and searching for plants to eat. They did not settle in one location but instead lived in temporary shelters like caves or simple huts made from branches and animal skins.

Another key feature was the hunting-gathering lifestyle, meaning they obtained their food by hunting animals and gathering wild plants, fruits, and nuts. These activities were essential for the survival of Paleolithic humans.
